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# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear members and subscribers,

It gives me great pleasure to present our Annual Report for financial year ended 30 June 2025. Our chosen theme this time is "The Voice that Matters" which reflects the very essence of SIAS existence and the purposes that we continue to serve.

For 26 years, SIAS has stood as the collective voice of retail investors in Singapore, starting in 1999 when we spoke on behalf of 172,000 investors who faced staggering losses when Malaysian stocks abruptly stopped trading on the over-the-counter platform known as Clob International.

Once the dust had settled after that episode, SIAS continued to represent and educate the average retail investor, advocating fairness, transparency and accountability in Singapore's capital market.

Our fight for the small shareholder's rights is not an end in itself, but rather because ensuring a level playing field for all investors builds confidence, and confidence is the foundation of strong, vibrant markets.

Speaking of market vibrancy, there have been two opposing forces at work in the local financial market over the 12 months to June this year.

First were the sudden, sweeping tariffs that the US announced in April on more than a hundred countries that sent all stock markets plunging because of the anticipated adverse impact on world trade and economic growth.

The second was announcement of the S\$5b injection from the Monetary Authority of Singapore (MAS) under its Equity Market Development Programme (EQDP) which is geared towards boosting interest and liquidity in the local stock market.

Fortunately, the US has back-tracked on many of its initial proposals whilst others have been renegotiated. Markets have been relieved by this, and the blow to global growth from the remaining tariffs is not expected to be as large as it was in April.

As a result, markets have since recovered all their April losses and turned their attention to interest rates and the likelihood of multiple rate cuts before the end of the year.

In Singapore, news that S\$1.1b of the EQDP's \$5b has been allocated to three fund managers has also helped lift sentiment, enabling the StraitsTimes Index to close above 4,000 for the first time ever in early July.

Since then, a US interest rate cut in mid-September has helped the index go from strength to strength, and it has risen above 4,300 in early September. Many commentators have expressed optimism over the market's outlook, which validates SIAS's call over the past 12 months that investors should "buy Singapore".

However, a bullish outlook does not mean investors should throw caution to the wind as there are still risks ahead. One is simmering trade tensions between the US and China which are yet unresolved whilst another is the instability in the Middle East where the situation remains highly volatile.

There are also concerns over how artificial intelligence or Al will affect jobs, earnings and economic growth. Furthermore, lower interest rates whilst benefiting some sectors, could lead to margin compression for the three banks, which form the central pillar of the local stock market and the STI.

On the local front, the 10 per cent US tariff on Singapore's exports is expected to result in slow growth; however, because tariffs elsewhere have been dialled back since April, according to the latest MAS quarterly survey of professional forecasters in Sep, the Singapore economy is expected to grow 2.4% this year, higher than the June estimate of 1.7%.

The latest growth forecast is underpinned by the improved outlook for manufacturing, construction, wholesale and retail trade, and key exports.

I am pleased to report that SIAS had six articles published in the StraitsTimes (ST) and BusinessTimes (BT) during financial year ended 30 June 2025.

The first, titled "Is the Singapore market as bad as it's made out to be?" appeared in ST on 5 Nov 2024 and was aimed at debunking the notion that local market lacked any redeeming features and was not worthy of investment consideration.

It highlighted the market's safe haven status, the strong dividends paid by blue chips and focused on real estate investment trusts (REITs) as a possible area for investors to consider.

It's worth noting that since that article was published the Straits Times Index has risen by about 20% and many analysts are today recommending REITs since they will be prime beneficiaries of lower interest rates.

Among the other commentaries by SIAS were lessons companies could learn from a massive scandal involving the UK postal service and a call for fund managers, who are beneficiaries of the EQDP, to play a more active role in ensuring companies they are invested in practice good corporate governance. SIAS was also actively involved in the privatization of Sinarmas Land, arguing on behalf of minorities that the initial offer price of S\$0.31 was too low relative to the net asset value of S\$0.85 per share.

SIAS disagreed with the independent financial adviser's (IFA's) advice that although the price was "not fair but reasonable" shareholders should nevertheless accept the offer.

SIAS presented an alternative valuation methodology to demonstrate to shareholders that there were other, equally plausible and defensible approaches to pricing a privatization offer which could yield higher prices.

As it turned out, the offer price was subsequently raised by 21% to \$\$0.375 – a significant improvement over the original.

In addition to articles in the media, SIAS issued multiple press releases on several companies that were engaged in various corporate exercises that may have been confusing to shareholders.

For instance, one major event was OCBC's attempt to privatize Great Eastern Holdings (GEH) and to assist shareholders in deciding which way to vote, SIAS's press release contained several pertinent questions put to the GEH board, including why shareholders were advised to accept the offer despite the IFA's view that the offer was "not fair but reasonable".

Another set of questions were sent to FuYu Corp following the resignation of three independent directors amidst a boardroom tussle whilst press releases were also issued to advise shareholders in the cases involving the privatization attempts made for Singapore Paincare, Nera Telecom and Sin Heng Heavy Machinery, as well as the unconditional mandatory general offer for Agarva Ltd.

Another area of shareholder advocacy which was pioneered by SIAS several years ago is the three questions which are sent to companies ahead of their Annual General Meeting (AGM).

The three areas covered are financial performance, business strategies and corporate governance, and companies are requested to post their answers online ahead of their AGMs so that shareholders are aware of the important issues facing their companies.

I am pleased to report that in FY2025, SIAS sent questions to 206 companies and received 147 replies.

The retail investing public can rest assured that SIAS will continue to push for fair and transparent financial markets, promoting the best corporate governance practices and policies and regulations that protect the rights and interests of individual investors.

# OUR GOVERNANCE FRAMEWORK

One of the three tenets of SIAS is promoting good corporate governance practices. Therefore, it is important we practise what we preach. It has now become even more essential for SIAS as a Charity and an IPC to embrace good governance practices. Appointing an Honorary Chairman and three governance committees are some of the key initiatives undertaken by the Management Committee to ensure good governance at SIAS.

#### **HONORARY CHAIRMAN**

Mr Daniel Teo was appointed as the 5th Honorary Chairman with effect from 1 August 2018.

The appointment of the Honorary Chairman, who is independent and non-executive, is to provide the check and balance within the Association, as provided for by our Constitution. This Constitutional appointment is all the more necessary as the current founding President is also the Chief Executive. The Chairman is empowered to intervene in the event he is of the view that the President and/or the Committee has acted in breach of the Association's Constitution or not acting in the interest of the Association. In such a situation, he can direct the President or the Committee, as the case may be, to comply with the Constitution forthwith and to act in the interest of the Association. The Chairman has to be a person of high stature with extensive knowledge and experience.

Mr Daniel Teo is presently a director of the Tong Eng Group of Companies, and is the Chairman and Managing Director of the Hong How Group of Companies. As a noted real estate developer and investor, Mr. Teo was the President of the Real Estate Development Association of Singapore for numerous terms, the last term being from 1998 to 2001. He was also the World President of the International Real Estate Federation from 2000 to 2001.

Some of his projects have won the Urban Redevelopment Authority's Architectural Heritage Award for Conservation and Adaptive Re-use in 1995, 2010 and 2013. MrTeo is an active promoter of culture and arts in Singapore. In 1981, he was the founder member of the Singapore Cultural Foundation which has since come under the purview of the National Arts Council. MrTeo was awarded "Patron of Heritage" by the National Heritage Board for 2008 and 2013.

Key Functions: To ensure President and Management Committee comply with the Constitution and act in the interest of the Association.

# COMPOSITION OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The Management Committee strives to ensure that the members, as a group, have core competencies in areas such as accounting and finance, management, law, strategic planning, social enterprise and community-related experience, and that they bring on board a degree of diversity and viewpoints, expertise and experiences. No Management Committee member shall be related to another member by blood or marriage. Except for the Founder and President, who is also the CEO and staff of the Association, and is a member of the Management Committee allowed by the Constitution, no other staff is on the SIAS Management Committee. In addition, other members of management are invited from time to time to attend and make presentations at Management Committee meetings.

The Management Committee believes that to be effective, it should not be too large, whilst at the same time ensuring that there is sufficient range and diversity of expertise, gender, and viewpoints. Our Management Committee size ensures a good balance between continuity, renewal and compliance with charity regulations. The Management Committee has a formalised process for the appointment/re-appointment of committee members; including the President and members of Governance Committees, and forms part of the Constitution. All candidates have to be cleared by the Nomination Committee to ensure compliance with the requirements of the Constitution.

# **GOVERNANCE COMMITTEES**

## Audit & Risk Sub Committee (2023 – 2027)

The Audit Committee, a Constitutional appointment by the Management Committee, has been renamed the Audit & Risk Committee (ARC) after the responsibility of reviewing the risks of the association was included as part of the terms of the committee. Its members are appointed for a term of 4 years. The primary function of this Committee is to independently assist the Management Committee in fulfilling the oversight and fiduciary responsibilities, to act in the interest of SIAS' members and stakeholders as a whole, by supporting the Management Committee in their responsibilities regarding issues of risk, control and governance, and associated assurance.

The Committee oversees and appraises the nature and extent of the audit process carried out by the external auditors. It also reviews the findings of the external auditors relating to their assessment of the adequacy and effectiveness of the significant internal controls, including operational and financial controls and compliance controls, and risk management processes and evaluated adherence to established policies, processes and practices. It reviews the actions proposed to be taken by the management to address the findings of the auditors and undertakes the review of the financial statements with the external auditors and recommended to the MC for approval.

The external auditors have unrestricted access to the Audit & Risk Sub Committee.

The Audit & Risk Committee members met twice in the financial year to review follow up audits performed by the internal auditors and with external auditors to review the audit workplan and results of the FY 24/25 audit. The committee has examined the audited accounts and has met with the senior management to clarify matters arising from the preparation of the audited accounts making sure the processes are complete.

# Nomination Sub Committee (2023 - 2025)

The Nomination Committee is a Constitutional appointment by the Management Committee. The objective of the Nomination Committee is to lead the process of selection of the most suitable candidate or candidates for appointment to the Management Committee and to make recommendations to the Management Committee. The members are appointed for a term of 3 years.

The Nomination Committee reviews the applications from Ordinary members intending to stand for the Management Committee, at least 21 days from the Annual General Meeting, and submits to the Nomination Committee for approval within 7 days of submission. Once the Nomination Committee has approved the nomination, shortlisted candidates will be subject to election at the Annual General Meeting with a simple majority.

The Nomination Committee ensures that the candidate is of good standing, is free from any criminal record, is not an undischarged bankrupt and is able to contribute to SIAS. The candidate should not have been removed from any Committee or Member of an Organisation for poor performance, neglect or unruly conduct.

## **Conflict Of Interest Policy**

#### 1. PURPOSE

1.1 As members of the Management Committee and staff of the SIAS which is a charity, we have an obligation to act in its best interest. Hence, we need to avoid situations where there may be real, potential or perceived conflicts of interest, which may arise where a member's personal or family interest conflicts with those of SIAS

1.2 Such conflicts may create problems that may result in the following: a) Cause damage to the Charity's reputation which may lead to its inability to sustain operations; b) Influence the members' judgment and compromise objectivity c) Restrict free discussion, thus resulting in decisions or actions that are not in the interests of the Charity; and d) Risk the impression that the Charity has acted improperly.

1.3 This Policy aims to protect both the Charity and its members from any appearance of impropriety.

#### 2. DEFINITIONS

2.1 "Charity" refers to the Securities Investors Association (Singapore) (SIAS) as the issuer of this document.

2.2 "Member" refers to a Management Committee member or management member or staff member or volunteer member of the charity.

2.3 "Policy" refers to the Conflict of Interest Policy.

2.4 "Interest" means any commitment, investment, relationship, obligation, or involvement, financial or otherwise that may influence a person's judgement. This would include: a. Direct interest – ownership in the name of the member / staff; b. Indirect interest – ownership beneficially held through another investment, estate, trust or other intermediary; c. Vested interest – personal stake or involvement, which may or may not include an expectation of financial gain; and d. Deemed interest – a member / staff is deemed to have an interest which his / her spouse / domestic partner holds an interest in.

2.5 A conflict of interest arises when the personal interests of the member / staff may potentially

interfere with the performance of his / her duties in the charity. When actual, potential or perceived conflict of interest arises, the integrity, fairness and accountability of the person may be affected, which could impede the best interest of the charity.

## 3. DECLARATION OF INTERESTS

3.1 Given the stated purpose of this Policy, we are asking: a. Management Committee and management members to declare their interests, and any gifts or hospitality received in connection with their role in the Charity; and b. Staff and volunteer members to declare when the transaction to be effected may result in a conflict of interest.

3.2 A declaration of interests form is provided for this purpose. The types of interest to be declared will include, but not limited to the following: a. Members who have friends or other personal or business relationships must carefully consider whether those relationships create conflicts of interest with their entrusted role in the Charity.

Examples include: i) Hiring a relative or friend as an employee or vendor, ii) Buying or selling goods or services from / to a family business for which others might compete, iii) Having a personal relationship where there is an immediate reporting relationship, iv) Volunteering and / or having memberships in any other charities, or v) Receiving goods / services as beneficiaries. b. Members must disclose any outside activities, financial interest or relationship that may pose a real, potential or perceived conflict of interest. Disclosures are to be made to the Management Committee / Senior Management / Supervisors and Head of the Human Resources Department, with the required approval obtained before accepting any position as an officer or director of an outside business.

3.3To be effective, the declaration of interests needs to be updated in written form at least annually and also when any changes occur.

3.4 In situations where members are not sure what to declare, or whether / when your declaration needs to be updated, they are strongly encouraged to err on the side of caution or seek advice from the Management Committee / Senior Management / Supervisors.

3.5 All disclosure of interest made by members and decisions made by the Management Committee / Senior Management of the charity on such matters must be recorded, updated and filed with the Head of the Human Resource or his or her designated.

# 4. OPERATING PROCEDURES

- 4.1 If the Management Committee needs to make a decision on an issue where the Management Committee member(s) has / have an interest, it is the responsibility of the Management Committee member(s) to: a) Identify the potential conflict of interest; b) Not participate in discussion of the program or motion being considered; and c). Not vote on the issue.
- 4.2 If the Management Committee needs to make a decision on an issue where the Management Committee member(s) has / have an interest, it is the responsibility of the Management Committee to ensure that: a) All decisions are made by vote, with a two-thirds majority required based on the presence of a quorum; and b) Interested board members must not vote on matters affecting their own interests.
- 4.3 It is the responsibility of the Management Committee to: a) Only decide to hire or contract with any vendor if they are the best qualified individuals available, and willing to provide the goods or services needed at the best price. The Management Committee's decision shall not be influenced in any way by the fact that a Management Committee member has an interest in the contract. b) Record in the minutes of the Management Committee Meeting the potential conflict of interest, and the use of the procedures and criteria of this policy.
- 4.4 It is the sole responsibility of any member of the Charity to report any possible real, potential or perceived conflict of interest. If it is an oversight of the Charity, the member shall promptly inform the Charity that he has been put in such a position of conflict of interest.
- 4.5 No member of the Charity shall derive any personal profit or gain, directly or indirectly, by reason of his or her participation with the Charity. Each individual shall disclose to the Charity any personal interest which he or she may have in any matter pending before the organisation and shall refrain from participation in any decision on such matter.
- 4.6 Any member of the Charity or of a client organisation or vendor of the Charity shall identify

his or her affiliation with such agency or agencies; further, he shall not participate in the decision affecting that agency.

- 4.7 Any member of the Charity or its Consultants / Business Partners shall refrain from obtaining any list of clients for personal or private solicitation purposes at any time during the term of their affiliation.
- 4.8 Any member who is also a user of the Charity's services, or the carer of someone who uses the charity's services shall not be involved in decisions that directly affect the service received by the person he / she cares for. He / She shall declare his / her interest at the earliest opportunity and withdraw from any subsequent discussion. The same applies if the conflict concerns any other reason(s).
- 4.9 A member of the Charity may, however, participate in discussions from which he / she may indirectly benefit, for example where the benefits are universal to all users.
- 4.10 The Management Committee of the charity shall have the right to suspend any involvement of any member /staff when it has come to their attention that a potential, actual or perceived conflict has arisen, but has not been voluntarily disclosed by the relevant member.

## 5. VIOLATIONS

5.1 Any violation will result in discipline, up to and including termination from employment or removal from the Management Committee, or expulsion from being a volunteer member of the charity.

## WHISTLEBLOWING POLICY

SIAS is committed to the highest standards of honesty, transparency, ethical and legal conduct and accountability. The whistleblowing policy aims to provide an avenue for employees and external parties to raise genuine concerns relating to any aspect of SIAS' operations, including serious breaches of the code of conduct by employees. The aim of the policy is to:

- a. Promote standards for good financial and corporate practices and to deter wrongdoing.
- b. Provide proper avenues for employees and external parties to raise concerns about suspected improprieties and receive feedback on any action taken.

- c. Give employees and external parties the assurance that they will be protected from reprisals or victimisation for whistleblowing in good faith.
- d. Reportable incidents

Some examples of concerns covered (though not exhaustive) by this policy include:

- a. Impropriety, corruption, theft / misuse of SIAS' properties / assets / resources.
- b. Conduct which is an offence or breach of law.
- c. Breach of or failure to implement or comply with SIAS' policies.
- d. Concerns about SIAS' accounting, internal controls or auditing matters.
- e. Serious conflict of interest without disclosure, resulting in material gain.
- f. Acts which mislead, deceive, manipulate, coerce or fraudulently influence any internal or external accountant or auditor in connection with the preparation, examination, audit or review of any financial statements or records of SIAS.
- g. Abuse of power or authority, for example, CEO asking Finance Manager to make false declarations on company's accounts.
- h. Physical and emotional bullying by colleague.
- i. Sexual harassment: Physical harassment (sexual gestures, inappropriate touching etc.). Verbal harassment (sexual comments / jokes, asking for sexual favours etc.). Visual harassment (showing derogatory or pornographic materials etc.). Any other serious improper matters which may cause financial or non-financial loss to SIAS or damage to SIAS' reputation.
- j. Fraud or the making of fraudulent statements to members of the public and regulatory authorities.
- k. Concealing information about any malpractice or misconduct.
- I. Intentional provision of incorrect information to public bodies.

## PROTECTION AGAINST REPRISAL

SIAS recognises that the decision to report a concern can be a difficult one to make, not least, because of the fear of reprisal from those responsible for the alleged malpractice. SIAS will not tolerate harassment or victimisation and will take all possible action to protect anyone who raises a concern in good faith. However, SIAS does not condone frivolous, mischievous or malicious allegations and anyone making such allegations may face disciplinary act.

## **CONFIDENTIALITY**

SIAS requires the whistleblower to identify himself/ herself when raising a concern or providing information. All concerns will be treated with the strictest confidentiality. Exceptional circumstances under which information provided by the whistleblower could or would not be treated with confidentiality include:

a. Where SIAS is under a legal obligation to disclose information provided.

Such reports are preferably made in writing, either in the form of a letter or email, and in detail setting

out the background and history of events as well as the reason(s) for concern.

Assessment of the concern or information shall be made with due consideration given to the following factors:

- a. Seriousness of the issue raised;
- b. Credibility of the concern or information; and
- c. Likelihood of confirming the concern or information from the attributable sources

Depending on the nature of the concern raised or information provided, the investigation will be conducted, involving one or more of the following individuals or entities:

- a. The Audit Committee
- b. The External Auditor, and / or
- c. The Police or Commercial Affairs Department

The amount of contact between the whistleblower and the person(s) investigating the concern raised or information provided will be determined by the nature and clarity of the matter reported. Further information may be sought from the whistleblower during the course of the investigation. When the investigation is completed, the investigating officer(s) will report the findings to the Audit Committee for its necessary action.

If the whistleblower identifies himself/herself, the Audit Committee will look into the matter and will reply to the person within 2 weeks. If the message is anonymous there is no obligation for the Audit Committee to respond. The Audit Committee will decide if the report is deemed as whistleblowing based on the policy as stated above.

#### **RESERVE POLICY**

The reserves of the association provide financial stability and the means for the development of the association's activities. The association has a target reserve ratio of one (1) and will strive to work towards maintaining this ratio by engaging in approved activities that are accretive to its bottom line. The Management Committee reviews the level of reserves at the bi-monthly meetings to ensure the ratio is maintained at 1.



#### STAFF LEARNING AND DEVELOPMENT



At SIAS, our people are our greatest assets. To stay adaptable in a fast-evolving industry, we actively support staff participation in both our 148 investing education programmes and other relevant external training opportunities.

We continue to offer essential learning courses such as Microsoft Excel and Personal Data Protection to ensure staff have the practical skills needed in their roles. This year, 51% of employees have completed certifiable courses aligned with their job functions to advancing their professional and personal effectiveness, achieving improved operational efficiency.

As part of our commitment to continuous learning, SIAS staff also participate in the annual group training to develop new skillsets and foster a culture of knowledge sharing, strengthen collaboration and develop new capabilities. These sessions are designed not only to enhance individual competencies but also to strengthen team cohesion and communication.



In 2025, staff attended a one-day Communications Coaching course focused on enhancing internal and external communication with various stakeholders. The course also helped team members better understand each other's communication styles and strengths, enabling more effective teamwork. 55% of our staff attended the course, and they found the training beneficial and impactful. We have also organised cybersecurity training for employees to provide the knowledge and skills they needed to manage risks and stay aware of the current threats. 59% of our staff attended and passed the programme's final assessment.

Yearly the investment clubs promote financial literacy among students and youths in Singapore. Often engaging SIAS in collaborative efforts such as:



Led by SIAS Speaker Gerald Wong, the session provided students with essential insights and practical strategies for understanding and navigating volatile market trends influenced by global developments.

NUS Invest FAFI 101: "How I used fundamental analysis as an equity analyst?" Featuring SIAS speaker Gerald Wong for this virtual session where he provided aspiring analysts with a comprehensive guide to stock analysis, He demonstrated examples to evaluate companies through multiple lenses including macroeconomic outlooks, industry trends, company-specific factors, financial performance assessment and risk analysis. This practical deep dive equipped students with invaluable skills for navigating equity research.

SMU EYE, EYEHangout1: Introduction to Finance, marking the start of SMU EYE AY24/25. This foundational event attracted over 100 students, providing them with valuable insights into intricacies of financial markets and the essential principles of stock investing. Hazelle spoke on behalf of SIAS, covering the structure and function of financial markets, equipping students with a solid understanding of fundamental investment

concepts. The event concluded with a fireside chat and Q&A session allowing students to deepen their understanding and interact with speakers on a wide array of finance topics.

SIM-INC Workshop: SIAS collaborated with SIM-INC to present an online webinar titled "Basic of stock investing," designed to equip participants with fundamental knowledge and practical strategies, this webinar was led by Hazelle speaking on behalf of SIAS, which empowered attendees to master stock investing fundamentals which includes techniques to identify undervalued stocks. This year, we significantly stepped up our social media efforts, expanding the range and frequency of our content to better engage with our audience. Our posts have covered a broad spectrum from event highlights and investor dialogue sessions to SIAS press releases and timely market commentaries. The primary objective remained clear to reach and

connect with as many investors as possible through accessible, relevant, and value-driven content.

We refined our content strategy by leveraging platform-specific media formats to enhance

efficiency, reach and engagement. For example, we engaged in short-form videos and reels for platforms like Instagram and Facebook to recap events, infographics and carousels to simplify complex information, video recaps for LinkedIn and YouTube and key takeaways to boost shareability and visibility.

Beyond digital engagement, we also placed a strong emphasis on on-the-ground presence through participation in key investor roadshows aimed at subscriber acquisition. Notable examples include MooFest, CPF Ready for Life Festival, and Invest Fair KL. These events allowed us to engage directly with prospective investors, raise brand awareness, and strengthen our community outreach efforts.

As a result of these combined efforts, our social media platforms recorded notable audience growth, with LinkedIn increasing by 94.38%, Instagram by 25.8%, YouTube by 9.42%, and Facebook by 0.61%. These gains reflect the effectiveness of our integrated marketing strategy in reaching and resonating with a broader investor base.

## **ESG EFFORT IN SIAS**

#### **Commitment to ESG**

SIAS will continue to stay dedicated to sustainable practices, aligning with global and national goals. For this year, the ESG Roadmap was set in place, that will grow through engagements with staff to have in place a sustainable working environment that fosters good work ethics.

The Green and Sustainability Sub-Committee had emphasized the importance of a roadmap for sustainability education. In addition to that, SIAS Initiative on Q&A on Annual Report to Singapore Big and Mid Cap Listed Companies have also included at least one mandatory question on sustainability.

#### **ESG** Initiatives

SIAS Green & Sustainability Sub-Committee has been actively engaging external stakeholders to explore potential partnerships. In FY24/25, the committee met up with Singapore Sustainable Finance Association (SSFA) highlighting shared interest in advancing green and sustainable practices. A list of actions was identified which includes Investor Education for ESG, Sustainability Dialogues on Forums and Collaborative Research on Green Finance Products.

The Committee also had a meeting with SGX to discuss the current limitations of the ESG Framework for listed companies. Noting minimal impact on valuation premiums and Investor benefits. While not mandatory, ESGenome was the common topic brought up by SGX and SIAS, which can offer a standardized approach to data collection and comparison. SGX and SIAS also came up with a list of recommendations, which includes: (1) Educating Retail investors with a common language such as developed publications for scope 1-3 emissions; (2)To enhance Q&A on AR: to include an

additional question on Sustainability, and request for companies to submit their ESG reports to ESGenome; (3) Utilize ESGenome data to support SIAS Corporate Sustainability Award.

These discussions with potential partners are still a work in progress and will be developed in the near future.

#### **Staff Engagement**

Staff members continue to incorporate best practices in their day-to-day work. At SIAS, the teams are encouraged to take greater ownership by doing their part for the environment such as switching off the office light when not in use.

#### **Governance Initiatives**

A skillset matrix for the management committee (MC) was developed to ensure a diverse mix of expertise. Policies on Anti-Money Laundering (AML) and Counter Financing of Terrorism (CFT) have been developed with staff being briefed on the risks of AML and CFT Volunteer management policies and procedures, including Non-Disclosure Agreements (NDA), Conflict of Interest Declarations and Volunteer' code of conduct, are in place. Regular internal reviews are conducted to ensure compliance with Charity Corporate Governance and FSDF restrictions. Performance metrics are reported to the CEO to track our progress on the status of the achievement of funders mandated Key Performance Indicators (KPIs)

SIAS' efforts to incorporate ESG principles into its operations demonstrates our commitment to fostering ESG inclusive work environment. Through continuous engagement, environmental and social initiatives, and robust governance practices, SIAS will continue to strive to contribute positively to

ESG outcomes to support the broader goals of sustainability.

#### **Q&A** on Listed Issuers:

In line with our commitment to corporate accountability and transparency, SIAS took the initiative to enhance its annual report Q&A to include more sustainability factors that would be aligned with evolving market trends and investor's needs. These enhanced questions cover not only traditional financial and governance metrics, but also key ESG considerations that can empower investors to engage effectively with management and boards at AGMs. In FY24/25 the Q&A initiative sent sustainability questions to 50 companies, and 68% responded.

The initiative is also valuable during the AGM season, offering concise insights for time-constrained investors and providing crucial information on less-followed, potentially illiquid companies. By weaving in ESG metrics, this initiative supports higher quality sustainability reporting from listed companies that compliments SGX's climate reporting standards (TCFD) and promoting standardized disclosures through SGX's core ESG metrics. The integration of ESG analysis underscores the global shift towards sustainable investing, ultimately enhancing investor information quality and driving better corporate practices.

#### **Social Initiatives**

SIAS is committed to fostering diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) within our workforce. Comprehensive guidelines are provided through our HR Handbook and Manual. Staff are encouraged to participate actively in monthly Work in Progress (WIP) meetings and half-yearly appraisals. Exit interviews are conducted to gather feedback from resigning employees. Fair and ethical treatment of employees is enshrined in the SIAS Code of Ethics.

SIAS had also embedded ESG principles in its community programs, addressing social issues such as the prevention of investment scams and outreach to vulnerable groups. We support staff training and development through an incentive program to encourage staff's continuous learning and growth.

We have organised a variety of technical and soft skills courses for staff in FY24/5, ranging from Microsoft Excel courses, specialised professional training to cybersecurity and communication coaching. These trainings are available to all employees to attend. More details are available in the Learning & Development section below.

SIAS adopts flexible work arrangements to support employees' work-life harmony and promote a more engaged and productive workforce. These are provided through flexible working hours, work from home and part-time work arrangements to accommodate different employee needs while also aligning to our operational needs.

On Staff performance, we have conducted fair and transparent assessment of the performance of staffs regardless of gender and race. HR policies are periodically reviewed to ensure their relevance and equity to all employees.

#### **Environmental Initiative**

Environmental efforts are made aware to all staffs. We are encouraged to bring our own water bottles and lunch boxes to reduce the use of single-use plastics. Beyond individual habits, we also ensure responsible resource consumption by diligently turning off air-conditioning and lights when not in use. While SIAS does not have any direct environmental footprint, we remain fully committed in staying updated on current global affairs and best practices in sustainability, ensuring our internal policies and advocacy efforts remain aligned with evolving environmental standards.

#### **Summary of Activities and Attendees**

Since 2024, SIAS pivoted towards all online webinars, continuing to extend its reach and activities. SIAS organised a total of **200** activities reaching out to **49,978** participants.






# INTRODUCTION TO APPLIED TECHNICAL ANALYSIS

Exchange Traded Funds (ETFs) represent a milestone in the evolution of financial products. Combining the diversification benefits of unit trust funds and the liquidity of stocks, ETFs are cost efficient products that provide exposure to whatever markets, asset classes or sectors that the investor desires. Already comprising a substantial portion of trading in US markets, the variety and size of ETFs are set to continue growing both overseas and in the Singapore market.

# Actively managed ETFs SIAS

- An actively managed ETF may have a benchmark index, but managers may change sector allocations, market-time trades, or deviate from the index as they see fit. This produces investment returns that do not perfectly mirror the underlying index.
- Many of them have higher expense ratios than a traditional index ETF, which puts pressure on fund managers to consistently outperform or beat the market.
- In 2022, actively managed ETFs accounted for about 15 percent of global net inflows in ETFs. By March 2023, that number had grown to 25 percent.

# **INVESTOR RIGHTS**

#### SHAREHOLDER ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITIES

The last one year has been dynamic for Singapore's listed companies, characterized by a series of corporate actions ranging from delistings and mergers & acquisitions to various capital-raising exercises and strategic realignments. Throughout this crucial period, SIAS has remained steadfast in its commitment to protecting and promoting the rights of retail investors, ensuring transparency, and advocating for robust corporate governance practices.

In FY2025, SIAS facilitated 25 shareholder engagement activities. SIAS continues to regularly engage with the management and boards of listed companies, particularly during significant corporate actions or when shareholder concerns arise. Our approach "in the boardroom, not the courtroom," fosters constructive dialogue to resolve disputes and ensure that minority shareholders' voices are heard. This has included dialogues with

companies facing delisting, those undergoing major restructuring or those facing shareholder dissent. Examples of corporate actions that SIAS moderated include the divestment of SingPost's Australia Business, privatisation of Paragon REIT and amendment of Trust Deed by Keppel Pacific Pacific Oak US REIT.

This financial year, SIAS provided 31 commentaries and press releases. Key issues addressed revolve around privatization offers and Voluntary Unconditional Cash Offer (VUCO) that raises concerns from retail investors in terms of the fairness and transparency of the deals. SIAS will continue to pay close attention to such corporate actions to ensure that existing shareholders' preemptive rights are respected where appropriate and that information provided enables investors to make informed decisions.

#### **BRIEFING SESSIONS WITH LISTED COMPANIES**

SIAS organises briefing sessions to provide a crucial platform for shareholders to meet directly with company management ahead of Annual General Meetings (AGMs). Here, investors gain a deeper understanding of the latest financial year performance and future growth plans, and critically, have the opportunity to raise queries and voice concerns before casting their votes. This proactive engagement mechanism proved instrumental in addressing frustrations of minority shareholders who previously felt outvoted or unheard in general meetings.



#### **DIALOGUE SESSIONS WITH LISTED COMPANIES**

SIAS organises dialogue session to serve as a two-way exchange platform, enabling direct communication between company management and their shareholders. By facilitating these dialogues, particularly for complex proposals like significant fund-raising, mergers & acquisitions or capital reductions, SIAS ensures that companies adhere to the best practice of publicly addressing substantial and relevant questions from shareholders before the proxy voting deadline. This provides investors with invaluable clarity on the rationale and implications of proposed corporate actions, empowering them to make well-informed decisions and cast their votes with confidence, aligning with SIAS's overarching mission of advocating for minority shareholders "in the boardroom and not in the courtroom."



#### **DISPUTES AND COMPLAINTS RESOLUTION**

This financial year, we received a total of 132 emails from members and investors, primarily concerning investment matters and advice on investor rights. This marks a 16% increase compared to the previous financial year.

We've noted a marked rise in shareholder inquiries related to board composition, corporate governance, and the company's strategic direction. This uptick signals growing shareholder interest in transparency, oversight, and accountability at the board level. Such engagement reflects the active involvement of shareholders and their strong commitment to the long-term success of the company. As the voice of retail investors, we remain dedicated to fostering open and transparent communication between investors and the company.

A significant portion of the emails focused on requests for clarification on corporate actions and board decisions that directly impact shareholder value. Minority shareholders, in particular, raised concerns regarding exit offers during privatisation or delisting exercises—most notably OCBC's offer for Great Eastern and Sinarmas Land's offer. In these cases, SIAS provided guidance to help safeguard minority shareholder rights.

We also received emails from shareholders of delisted companies seeking advice on their ongoing rights, as well as from shareholders of Singapore Post Limited (SingPost) and FuYu Corporation Limited (FuYu), who requested guidance following the sudden resignation or removal of key management personnel.

Our commitment to advocating for minority shareholders remains steadfast. Through our "In the Boardroom and not in the Courtroom" approach, we will continue to engage company boards constructively while promoting awareness of governance standards and investor rights within the broader investment community.

#### **COMMENTARIES AND PRESS STATEMENTS**

SIAS actively keeps investors updated via media through a series of press releases and commentaries on key market and corporate developments. A total of 25 press releases and 6 commentaries were issued covering investor advocacy in corporate actions, market insights, regulatory engagement and thought leadership to frame broader governance and market debates. SIAS continues to observe low-ball privatisation offers by listed companies but has also managed

to successfully seek a Company to increase an offer price. These efforts reinforce SIAS' role as the voice of retail investors in Singapore. Our aim is to keep investors informed, highlight governance and transparency issues, and provide timely and independent perspectives on matters affecting shareholders and working closely with the media plays a vital role in amplifications of SIAS' messages.

#### **Background:**

SIAS launched the Q&A on Annual Reports in Jul 2016, posing at least a minimum of 3 questions on annual reports commencing with the companies which are low on the governance rating. Since 2020, the initiative was expanded to cover 250 listed companies a year, targeting at least 90% of all SGX issuers to be covered at least once in 4 years. Over the years, the scope of the questions have expanded and to-date, the focus is on the company's strategy, operations, financial statements, ESG and corporate governance practices.

The objective is to:

- a) Raise the standard of corporate governance among SGX listed companies
- b) Improve the quality of meetings by focusing the discussion on relevant and important areas impacting shareholders' investment
- c) Improve shareholder engagement and quality of communications on relevant areas
- d) Guide shareholders to ask questions, educate them and raise awareness on the key issues in the annual report

For the period of April 2024 – April 2025, SIAS has covered a total of 270 companies and continued to achieve a consistent response rate of approximately 72%.

The new element of Q&A on Listed Issuers launched in April 2024 is the additional focus on mid & small cap companies that are undervalued. Mid-cap companies with a price/book consistently below 1x (i.e., not achieving capital efficiency in excess of their cost of capital or achieving capital efficiency in excess of their cost of capital but future growth potential is not adequately expected by investors) will be required to disclose their policies and specific initiatives for improvement. SIAS will continue to raise questions on strategy, operations, financial, corporate governance and focus addition

scope for each market cap:

Big Cap: Sustainability Report

Mid Cap: Valuation and/or Sustainability Report

Small Cap: Governance and/or Valuation

#### **General Observations:**

The quality of responses from listed companies to SIAS questions has generally improved, with a focus on providing more specific and in-depth insights rather than boilerplate answers. This initiative is particularly valuable for companies that do not typically receive questions from shareholders, as it helps to fill this void. The quality of responses does not appear to correlate with a company's market capitalization; excellent and informative responses have come from small companies, while larger ones have sometimes provided unhelpful answers. This project continues to enable shareholders to get a better understanding of the board's perspective and identify potential misalignments between the board's standards and those of the shareholders.

The project also highlights the growing importance of questions related to Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) factors. While not traditionally a focus for analysts, these questions serve as a crucial reminder to boards that sustainability is fundamental to a group's long-term future. Furthermore, this initiative has been expanded to include Extraordinary General Meetings (EGMs). This expansion is significant as EGMs, especially those involving delisting or selective capital reduction resolutions, often represent the final opportunity for shareholders to seek accountability from the company and its board.

#### **Outreach and Marketing:**

To maximize the reach of its Q&A, SIAS actively promoted the content through various channels, going beyond website uploads and press releases. Marketing and communication efforts will be key to educating shareholders and raising awareness, even among potential investors. Highlighting the ESG aspects of the Q&A will be particularly important in engaging the investment community, especially those less familiar with sustainable investing. SIAS utilized its existing network, including mainstream media, its website, YouTube, LinkedIn, and Facebook, and collaborated with financial bloggers and online communities to disseminate the questions and company responses. This multipronged approach broadened the initiative's impact and engagement with younger investors who primarily use social media and digital platforms.

#### **CORPORATE GOVERNANCE RESEARCH**

The average overall Singapore Corporate Governance (SCG) scores have continued their upward trend, reaching 62.4% in 2024 over a four-year period from 2021. In 2024, big companies with market capitalisations of S\$1 billion and above maintained an average SCG score of 69.5%. Medium-sized companies, with market capitalisations ranging from S\$300 million to less than S\$1 billion, saw a modest improvement of 0.9 percentage points, achieving an average SCG score of 64.0%. Small-sized companies, with market capitalisations below S\$300 million, experienced the most significant improvement, with their average score rising by 2.9 percentage points to 61.6% in 2024.

#### AVERAGE SCG SCORES BY COMPANY SIZE




Figure 1: Average SCG Scores By Company Size N.B.

Corporate governance scores for business entities are generally lower than their sustainability scores. In 2024, the overall SCGA score for 477 publicly listed companies was 68.2. Analysing the component scores, the average corporate governance score was 62.4, while the average corporate sustainability score was 77.0. Among these entities, big-cap companies achieved the highest scores in both corporate governance and corporate sustainability, followed by mid-cap and small-cap companies, respectively.

#### AREASTHAT COMPANIES PERFORMED WELL

- All companies disclosed that they had a whistleblowing policy, and 79.5% of the companies disclosed its anti-corruption programmes and procedures.
- 2. 99.6% of the companies reported ESG topics that are material to the organization's strategy, and 79.0% of the companies identified climate change as a material issue.
- 3. 96.9% of the companies have a board of directors' diversity policy.
- 4. 93.3% of the companies disclosed information on unfavourable aspects.
- 5. 92.2% of the companies published relevant information relating to health, safety and welfare of its employees.
- 6. 91.2% of the companies disclosed criteria for board appraisal.
- 7. 90.6% of the companies disclosed the type of material transactions that require board approval.
- 8. 88.9% of the companies disclosed that its sustainability reporting process is internally reviewed.
- 9. 75.1% of the companies disclosed that their Interested Person Transactions were conducted in such a way to ensure that they are fair and at arms' length.
- 10. 73.0% of the companies disclosed all the directorships and chairmanships held by its directors at present and over the past 3 years.

#### AREASTHAT COMPANIES NEED IMPROVEMENT

- 5.7% of the companies disclosed the threshold of material transactions that require board approval.
- 6.1% of the companies disclosed that an external party was used at least periodically to conduct the board and/or individual director appraisal.
- 3. 6.7% of the companies released their notice of AGM (with detailed agenda and explanatory circulars), as announced to the Exchange, at least 28 days before the date of the meeting.
- 4. 9.9% of the companies disclosed that its board of directors conducted an annual performance assessment of the CEO/Managing Director.
- 5. 15.5% of the companies seek expert advice/ remuneration consultant at least periodically to decide on remuneration of all directors.
- 6. 17.2% of the companies disclosed that their remuneration committees had considered linking risk management and remuneration and ensuring that the level and structures of remuneration was aligned with the long-term interest and risk policies of the company.
- 7. 17.4% of the companies disclosed information on the succession planning for the board and senior management.
- 8. 26.2% of the companies disclosed a policy on payment of dividends if their company had paid dividends for the financial year.
- 9. 27.9% of the companies disclosed the details of their code of conduct or ethics.
- 10. 29.6% of the companies disclosed exact CEO's remuneration.

Integrating AI into decision-making can enhance efficiency and promote long-term sustainability, including improvements in climate and supply chain governance aligned with ESG goals. However, with ESG becoming central to corporate strategy and stakeholder engagement, it's crucial for organisations to address ESG fatigue through clear communication and demonstrable results, ensuring continued stakeholder support and meaningful progress.

# Notes to the Financial Statements 30 June 2025

#### 1. General information

Securities Investors Association (Singapore) (the "association") (Registration No. S99SS0111B) is registered in Singapore under the Societies Act 1966. The association is a charity registered under the Charities Act 1994 with effect from 8 May 2015. It is also an Institutions of a Public Character ("IPC") until 31 March 2028, subject to renewal. The financial statements are presented in Singapore Dollar.

The Management Committee approved and authorised these financial statements for issue on the date of the statement by the Management Committee.

The principal activities of the association are those of providing forum discussion of investment interests of members; presenting views to Singapore Exchange and other appropriate bodies, providing educational information and conducting research into various aspects of investments to and advisory services to members; and to act on behalf of members in Court of law, tribunals, conferences and administrative bodies to protect the interest of members.

The registered office address of the association is located at: 7 Maxwell Road, #05-03, MND Building, Annexe B, Singapore 069111. The association is situated in Singapore.

#### Statement of compliance with financial reporting standards

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards ("FRSs") and the related Interpretations to FRSs ("INT FRSs") as issued by the Accounting Standards Committee under ACRA ("ASC").

#### Basis of preparation of the financial statements

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention except where a financial reporting standard requires an alternative treatment (such as fair values) as disclosed where appropriate in these financial statements. The accounting policies in the financial reporting standards may not be applied when the effect of applying them is not material. The disclosures required by financial reporting standards may not be provided if the information resulting from that disclosure is not material.

#### 2A. Material accounting policy information

#### Foreign currency transactions

The functional currency is the Singapore Dollar as it reflects the primary economic environment in which the entity operates. Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded in the functional currency at the rates ruling at the dates of the transactions. At each end of the reporting year, recorded monetary balances and balances measured at fair value that are denominated in non-functional currencies are reported at the rates ruling at the end of the reporting year and fair value measurement dates respectively. All realised and unrealised exchange adjustment gains and losses are dealt with in profit or loss. The presentation is in the functional currency.

#### Fair value measurement

The fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. When measuring the fair value of an asset or a liability, market observable data to the extent possible is used. If the fair value of an asset or a liability is not directly observable, an estimate is made using valuation techniques that maximise the use of relevant observable inputs and minimise the use of unobservable inputs (eg by use of the market comparable approach that reflects recent transaction prices for similar items, discounted cash flow analysis, or option pricing models refined to reflect the issuer's specific circumstances). Inputs used are consistent with the characteristics of the asset / liability that market participants would take into account. The entity's intention to hold an asset or to settle or otherwise fulfil a liability is not taken into account as relevant when measuring fair value.

Fair values are categorised into different levels in a fair value hierarchy based on the degree to which the inputs to the measurement are observable and the significance of the inputs to the fair value measurement in its entirety: Level 1 fair value measurements are those derived from quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities. Level 2 fair value measurements are those derived from inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (ie as prices) or indirectly (ie derived from prices). Level 3 fair value measurements are those derived from valuation techniques that include inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs). Transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy are recognised at the end of the reporting period during which the change occurred.

The carrying values of current financial instruments approximate their fair values due to the short-term maturity of these instruments and the disclosures of fair value are not made when the carrying amount of current financial instruments is a reasonable approximation of the fair value. The fair values of non-current financial instruments may not be disclosed separately unless there are significant differences at the end of the reporting year and in the event the fair values are disclosed in the relevant notes to the financial statements. The recurring measurements are made at each reporting year end date.

#### 2A. Material accounting policy information (cont'd)

#### Revenue and income recognition

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the entity expects to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer (which excludes estimates of variable consideration that are subject to constraints, such as right of return exists, and modifications), net of any related taxes and excluding any amounts collected on behalf of third parties. An asset (goods or services) is transferred when or as the customer obtains control of that asset. As a practical expedient the effects of any significant financing component is not adjusted if the payment for the good or service will be within one year.

#### Seminars and conferences

Revenue from rendering of services that are of short duration is recognised when the services are completed.

#### **Sponsorship**

Sponsorship income is recognised upon the association performing an act or service where the promise under the contract is for a specified services that meets the over time criteria and revenue is recognised at the amount that the entity has the right to recognise the service provided.

#### Membership fees

Membership fees for activities held are recognised over the period when the services are rendered. Membership fees paid by sponsors for associate sponsored members are recognised over the period when the services are rendered.

#### **Donations**

Income from donations is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably. Recognition of donations subject to conditions is deferred until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the reporting entity and there is unconditional entitlement to the receipts.

#### Other income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

#### **Government grants**

Government grants are recognised at fair value when there is reasonable assurance that the conditions attaching to them will be complied with and that the grants will be received. Grants in recognition of specific expenses are recognised in profit or loss on a systematic basis over the periods necessary to match them with the related costs that they are intended to compensate. The grant related to assets is presented in the statement of financial position by recognising the grant as deferred income that is recognised in profit or loss on a systematic basis over the useful life of the asset and in the proportions in which depreciation expense on those assets is recognised.

#### 2A. Material accounting policy information (cont'd)

#### **Employee benefits**

Contributions to a defined contribution retirement benefit plan are recorded as an expense as they fall due. The entity's legal or constructive obligation is limited to the amount that it agrees to contribute to an independently administered fund (such as the Central Provident Fund in Singapore, a government managed defined contribution retirement benefit plan). For employee leave entitlement the expected cost of short-term employee benefits in the form of compensated absences is recognised in the case of accumulating compensated absences, when the employees render service that increases their entitlement to future compensated absences; and in the case of non-accumulating compensated absences, when the absences occur. A liability for bonuses is recognised where the entity is contractually obliged or where there is constructive obligation based on past practice.

#### Plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are carried at cost on initial recognition and after initial recognition at cost less any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Cost also includes acquisition cost and any cost directly attributable to bringing the asset or component to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management. Subsequent costs are recognised as an asset only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to profit or loss when they are incurred.

Depreciation is provided on a straight-line method to allocate the gross carrying amounts of the assets less their residual values over their estimated useful lives of each part of an item of these assets. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

Furniture and equipment -3-5 years Renovations -3-5 years

An asset is depreciated when it is available for use until it is derecognised even if during that period the item is idle. Fully depreciated assets still in use are retained in the financial statements.

The gain or loss arising from the derecognition of an item of plant and equipment is recognised in profit or loss.

## Right-of-use assets

The right-of-use assets are accounted and presented as if they were owned such as plant and equipment. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

Premises – Over the term of lease between 2 years to 3 years Equipment – Over the term of lease of 5 years

#### 2A. Material accounting policy information (cont'd)

#### Leases of lessee

Where a lease arrangement is identified, a liability to the lessor is recognised as a lease obligation calculated at the present value of minimum lease payments. A corresponding right-of-use asset is recorded. Lease payments are apportioned between finance costs and reduction of the lease liability so as to reflect the interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance charges are recorded as an expense. Right-of-use assets are depreciated over the shorter of the estimated useful life of the asset and the lease term. Leases with a term of 12 months or less and leases for low value are not recorded as a liability and lease payments are recognised as an expense in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

#### Carrying amounts of non-financial assets

The carrying amount of non-financial assets is reviewed at each end of the reporting year for indications of impairment and where an asset is impaired, it is written down through profit or loss to its estimated recoverable amount. The impairment loss is the excess of the carrying amount over the recoverable amount and is expensed.

#### **Financial instruments**

Recognition and derecognition of financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised when, and only when, the entity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. All other financial instruments (including regular-way purchases and sales of financial assets) are recognised and derecognised, as applicable, using trade date accounting or settlement date accounting. A financial asset is derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows in a transaction in which substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred or in which the entity neither transfers nor retains substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership and it does not retain control of the financial asset. A financial liability is removed from the statement of financial position when, and only when, it is extinguished, that is, when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expires.

At initial recognition the financial asset or financial liability is measured at its fair value plus or minus, in the case of a financial asset or financial liability not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of the financial asset or financial liability.

Classification of financial assets and financial liabilities and subsequent measurement

The financial reporting standard on financial instruments requires the certain classification of financial assets and financial liabilities. At the end of the reporting year, the reporting entity had the following classes:

#### Financial instruments (cont'd)

Classification of financial assets and financial liabilities and subsequent measurement (cont'd)

- Financial asset classified as measured at amortised cost: A financial asset is measured at amortised cost if it meets both of the following conditions and is not designated as at fair value through profit or loss ("FVTPL"), that is (a) the asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows; and (b) the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding. Typically trade and other receivables, bank and cash balances are classified in this category.
- Financial liabilities carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Typically lease liabilities and trade and other payables are classified in this category.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash comprises cash on hand and demand deposits.

For the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents includes cash and cash equivalents less cash subject to restriction and bank overdrafts payable on demand that form an integral part of cash management. Cash equivalents are short-term (three months or less), highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit or loss is adjusted for the effects of transactions of a non-cash nature, and items of income or expense associated with investing or financing cash flows.

#### 2B. Judgements and sources of estimation uncertainties

There were no critical judgements made in the process of applying the accounting policies that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements. There were no key assumptions concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting year, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next reporting year.

#### 3. Related party relationships and transactions

The financial reporting standard on related party disclosures requires the entity to disclose: (a) transactions with its related parties; and (b) relationships between parents and subsidiaries irrespective of whether there have been transactions between those related parties. A party is related to a party if the party controls, or is controlled by, or can significantly influence or is significantly influenced by the other party.

#### 3. Related party relationships and transactions (cont'd)

A related party includes the Management Committee and key management of the association. It also includes an entity or person that directly or indirectly controls, is controlled by, or is under common or joint control with these persons; members of the key management personnel or close members of the family of any individual referred to herein and others who have the ability to control, jointly control or significantly influence by or for which significant voting power in such entity resides with, directly or indirectly, any such individual.

It is not the normal practice for the trustees/office bearers, or people connected with them, to receive remuneration, or other benefits, from the association for which they are responsible, or from institutions connected with the association except as disclosed below.

#### 3A. Related party transactions and transactions

#### 22B. Financial risk management

The main purpose for holding or issuing financial instruments is to raise and manage the finances for the association's operating, investing and financing activities. There are exposure to the financial risks on the financial instruments such as credit risk and liquidity risk. Management has certain practices for the management of financial risks. However, these are not documented in formal written documents. The following guidelines are followed: All financial risk management activities are carried out and monitored by senior management staff. All financial risk management activities are carried out following acceptable market practices.

There have been no changes to exposure to risk; objectives, policies and processes for managing the risk and the methods used to measure the risk.

#### 22C. Fair values of financial instruments

The carrying values of current financial instruments approximate their fair values due to the short-term maturity of these instruments and the disclosures of fair value are not made when the carrying amount of current financial instruments is a reasonable approximation of the fair value.

#### 22. Financial instruments: information on financial risks and other explanatory information (cont'd)

#### 22D. Credit risk on financial assets

Financial assets subject to concentrations of credit risk and failures by counterparties to discharge their obligations in full or in a timely manner arise principally from cash balances with banks, receivables and other financial assets. The general approach in the financial reporting standard on financial instruments is applied to measure expected credit loss (ECL) allowance on financial assets. On initial recognition, a day-1 loss is recorded equal to the 12 month ECL unless the assets are considered credit impaired. The ECL allowance for debt assets is recognised at an amount equal to the lifetime ECL if the credit risk on that financial instrument has increased significantly since initial recognition. However, for trade receivables that do not contain a material financing component or when the reporting entity applies the practical expedient of not adjusting the effect of a material financing component, the simplified approach in calculating ECL is applied. Under the simplified approach, the loss allowance is recognised at an amount equal to lifetime ECL at each reporting date using historical loss rates for the respective risk categories and incorporating forward-looking estimates. Lifetime ECL may be estimated individually or collectively. For the credit risk on the financial assets an ongoing credit evaluation is performed on the financial condition of the debtors and any loss is recognised in profit or loss. Reviews and assessments of credit exposures in excess of designated limits are made. Renewals and reviews of credits limits are subject to the same review process.

Note 15 discloses the cash balances. There was no identified impairment loss.

### 22E. Liquidity risk – financial liabilities maturity analysis

The liquidity risk refers to the difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset. It is expected that all the financial liabilities will be settled at their contractual maturities. The average credit period taken to settle trade payables is about 30 to 60 days (2024: 30 to 60 days). The other payables are with short-term durations. The classification of the financial assets is shown in the statement of financial position as they may be available to meet liquidity needs and no further analysis is deemed necessary.

When the counterparty has a choice of when an amount is paid, the liability is included on the basis of the earliest date on which it can be required to pay.

# 23. Changes and adoption of financial reporting standards

For the current reporting year the ASC issued certain new or revised financial reporting standards. None had material impact on the association.

# 24. New or amended standards in issue but not yet effective

The ASC issued certain new or revised financial reporting standards for the future reporting years. None is expected to have material impact on the financial statements of the association based on its current operations.


